

POPE VICAR OF CHRIST AND CAN FORGIVE SINS

Father Prendergast Tells Non-Catholics What Church Holds About Its Head.

A large audience of non-Catholics listened to the sermon of Rev. Jeremiah Prendergast, S. J., at the mission services held in the Church of St. John the Baptist last night. He took as his topic "Who Is Pope Pius X?"

"The Pope is the vicar of Christ, or the visible head of the church on earth," declared the speaker. "The claims of the Pope are the same as the claims of Christ. Christ wanted all souls saved. So does the Pope. Christ can forgive all sin. So can the Pope. The Pope is the only man who claims the vicarage of Christ. His claim is not seriously opposed, and this establishes his authority.

"The powers given the Pope by Christ were given him not as a mere man, but as the representative of Christ. The Pope is more than the representative of Christ, for he is the fruit of His divinity and of the divine institution of the church.

"Spiritual authority is one thing and temporal authority another. A man can be a good Catholic and a good American citizen. The church has seldom, if ever, infringed upon the authority of the state, but the state has often infringed upon the authority of the church.

"The Pope interprets the teachings of Christ without error. In his private life the Pope is fallible and may commit sin. For this reason he goes to confession every week as all good Catholics should."

ONONDAGA PARK WANTED FOR ZOOLOGICAL GARDEN

Hunters Club of Syracuse Will Go to Mayor With Suggestion.

At the meeting of the Hunters Club of Syracuse held last night in the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce in the University Block a resolution was unanimously passed declaring that it was the sentiment of the club that Onondaga Park be transformed into a zoological garden, and that a committee be appointed to present the matter to the city authorities. A committee will take up the matter with Mayor Edward-Schoeneck.

The secretary was directed to write the assemblymen and Senator from Onondaga county asking them to advocate the passage of recodification of the forest, fish and game law.

It was decided to have J. Alden Loring of the American Game Protection and Propagation Society lecture before the club. Mr. Loring gained fame as the naturalist of the hunting expedition of Theodore Roosevelt in Africa.

The club will hold a trap-shoot and fox chase at Rockaway Beach next Sunday afternoon. The shoot will determine the award of the Montgomery Cup.

A registered shoot will be held on July 4. The club now has two automatic traps in use at Rockaway Beach, and the permanent headquarters of the organization will be transferred there after July 4.

GOING OUT OF BUSINESS.

After doing business for sixty-nine years, the Union Salt Company, which owns the salt reservations in the West End, will go out of existence next month. The reason given is the diminished output and the increased cost caused by taxes, sewer and paving assessments.
